### OUR RIGHTS

Ogiek rights are human rights. Since colonial times Ogiek have always been denied their rights as contained in National laws and other International legal instruments. OPDP has started vigorous campaigns to promote and protect Ogiek Rights.

We are being treated as second class citizens of this country and yet we pay taxes to the Government.

## **OUR LANDS**

Land is a thorny issue in Kenya today. During the colonial period, Ogiek were not recognized as tribal entity and therefore excluded from the National distribution of Land in 1930s.

Successive Government regimes have continued to ignore and correct these historical injustices. Ogiek are now seeking justice through Courts. OPDP will continue assisting the community in this initiative.
